

Getting it right – Worship across the Blyth Valley Team

We have been talking about worship rather a lot recently. The Staff Team, Team Council, the Wider Ministry Team, and PCC's are all considering how on earth we manage to get the right balance of worship arrangements across our ten churches, and include, joyfully and with pleasure, our two churches "in alliance" Heveningham and Huntingfield, in the arrangements as well.

To be fair, one of the drivers for all these conversations is the fact that we are very tight on "staff" for Eucharistic worship. With Jan off sick and Edward not so well at times the last few months have been a struggle. There is light on the horizon. Jan is improving and hopes to be back at work in the near future, and Jane has joined the Team but the hard fact remains that without our lovely hard-working volunteers in the form of our retired clergy and readers, and without the willingness of our lay elders to lead worship we would have been really struggling. In putting our rotas together I have shamefully overworked David, Vic and Malcolm and relied heavily on Andrew from our neighbouring Deanery. We all know we cannot keep doing that and so we need to take a long hard look at our worship patterns and see how we can best meet our desire to give everyone the opportunity to worship fully and faithfully within the team.

Worship is at the core of our faith. The Church of England is blessed with some beautiful liturgy (orders of service) and permission to use a wide range of different forms of worship as well. The Eucharist (or Holy Communion) is the central most important form of service, but morning and evening worship (Book of Common Prayer/BCP style and Common Worship style) are also authorised forms of worship that should be regularly provided. And we already provide other forms of worship – the Iona Service at Holton, Breakfast Church at St Mary's Halesworth and Wissett, Pause for Thought at Wenhaston – as well.

We have already, reluctantly, had to reduce the number of Eucharists we can provide to the smaller village churches, and at 8.00am at St Mary's Halesworth. As of August we will be providing two 8.00am BCP services a month rather than four, which allows us to add two Eucharists a month elsewhere. We know that this leaves a few folk feeling let down and we are really sorry about that, but in the interests of equity it allows us to meet more than a few people's need

for a local Eucharist at their local church once every other month. Thank you to the Halesworth PCC and our loyal 8.00am congregation there for being so understanding. Thank you also to Blyford for agreeing to a Eucharist once every two months, and Chediston and Linstead for being so willing to travel to alternate Eucharistic services monthly and to Thorington for being sensible about holding services on high days and holidays. We are also clearly marking services as BCP when we are using the Book of Common Prayer form of Service in the monthly rota. Every PCC is willing to give lifts to folk who may want to attend a BCP service but cannot get to the one being provided that Sunday.

We also have a fabulous Team Choir, and a great Choir leader as well as three organists; but to add insult to injury, they too cannot be everywhere at once, so music in worship varies too.

Ideally we would want to meet everyone's wishes all of the time. Sadly, we can't. We can manage a "mixed diet", but are not quite sure what the best mix would look like. Do we have too many BCP services or too few? Do we provide enough Eucharistic services or not? Are our morning worship services too formal or too informal? Is Team Evensong something we only provide in the summer months? Should we think about Café Church, Messy Church, Pub Church, Saturday morning church? Should we arrange a formal transport service each Sunday to ensure folk can travel to the service that may best meet their own spiritual needs? Should we provide more contemplative forms of worship (a silent contemplative service, or a Taizé style every so often?).

We are really interested in everyone's views. Please do let us know what you think we should do to ensure we continue to provide a range of services across the 12 churches and why/how/when. Tell us your preferences, and suggest changes you think would make sense? Tell us what you think about the current pattern of worship, and what you think works best? Suggest new forms or worship you might like to attend? Please write to me, (Oak Cottage, The Street, Rumburgh IP19 OJX) email me (jane@janeheld.co.uk) or phone me (01986 781760) with your views. We will be looking at our worship patterns with a view to refreshing them from October, so your views are important.

Holy Days, Holidays

It's the holiday season for many, and I am firmly of the belief that the Church should be on 'slowrunning' in August - and not just the Church, although those involved in tourism are unlikely to be able to rest at this time of year. We human beings need space in our lives: space to be still, space for quiet reflection, space for restoration and healing. For much of Christian history (our British and European history) Saints' days and Holy Days allowed us that kind of space. And Sunday was a day of rest.

However, some in their nineties will tell of horrendous Sundays when everything was forbidden except the solemn trudge to church kingdom of heaven as a wedding feast. I'm sure and Sunday school. For young people, that must there was a lot of laughter in Jesus that some have been not rest but torture, and one of the reasons why church attendance began to drop after 1945.


Now here below is one of the most awful quotes I have ever read. It's by Jacobus Koelman (1632-1695) one of the most strident leaders of the second wave of the Dutch Reformation:

"Do not allow your children to celebrate the days on which unbelief and superstition are being catered to. They are admittedly inclined to want this because they see that the children of Roman Catholic parents observe those days. Do not let them attend carnivals, observe Shrove Tuesday (Mardi Gras), see Santa Claus, or observe Twelfth Night, because they are all remnants of an idolatrous papacy. You must not keep your children out of school or from work on those days nor let them play outside or join in the amusement. The Lord has said, "After the doings of the land of Egypt, where you lived, shall ye not do: and after the doings of the land of Canaan, where I bring you, you shall not do: neither shall you walk in their ordinances" (Lev. 18:3). The Lord will punish the Reformed on account of the days of Baal (Hosea 2:12-13), and he also observes what the children do on the occasion of such idolatry (Jer. 17:18). Therefore, do not let your children receive presents on Santa Claus day, nor let them draw tickets in a raffle and such things. Pick other days on which to give them the things that amuse them, and because the days of Christmas, Easter, and Pentecost have the same character, Reformed people must keep their children away from these so-called holy days and feast days."

Holy Day - and holidays - are important, as is fun



and laughter, joy and delight, and so on. Such things, when they are seemly and everyone's spirits are lifted up, are godly. Jesus enjoyed parties, and many of his stories describe the early Christians filtered out of the Gospels.

The default position for Christians should be celebration - starting with the Sunday Eucharist (led by erudite and witty clergy? No, scratch that. But we try). And I'm grateful for organisations (and there are several) that make a point of not starting their activities until after church.

So many people have to work so hard that restorative holidays are essential both to them and to their relationships. (And it's utterly immoral for travel companies to bump up prices in school holidays). Several decades ago, some experts predicted a time when leisure overtook work. It hasn't happened, but both work and play should be valuable and fulfilling.

Last point. I know a lot of people - and indeed poorer people - struggle, or are totally unable, to go away for a holiday. I've wondered for years if the Church shouldn't be booking an hotel in Well. That solves the Christmas present problem Brighton and a special train to get there, with volunteers to look after those who need it.

There are (usually American based) heretical Let's make the most of down-time on whatever day, and of holidays. That increases our wellbeing and puts us in better relationship with God and humankind.

Heard about but not yet seen!!! – the curious case of the not quite yet vanishing pews

I know that everyone was expecting the pews to disappear from St Mary's at the beginning of this year ... a visible sign of the start of our regeneration process. But there they still are ... hard and uncomfortable as they are. So what is happening? Anything at all?

Well to be very honest, not terribly much has happened for a while. Illness and over busy commitments elsewhere having overtaken everything. And to be even more honest, we lost a bit of oomph because of the setbacks and hiccups caused by our not being successful in being given the grants we applied for because St Mary's Halesworth is not "quite historical enough or falling down enough" (that is not quite how we were informed but that is the gist of it ... in the huge long list of applications priority is given each time to very, very historic or very damaged churches).

We do now have the faculty (planning permission) from the Diocese to remove the pews and replace them with lovely wooden chairs and make good and level off the floor. So why have we not done it? The quote is in, and we have a wonderful supportive builder ready to remove them. Well, three reasons: a. we have not reconvened as a regeneration steering group; b. we have also had the quote for replacing

the electricity and its not that cheap! and c. we really need to do the electricity BEFORE we do the pews so we do not have to lift a new floor.

So it's time to give ourselves a kick and get sorted out. We are reconvening the Regeneration Steering Group and meeting in September. We have two great new volunteers (someone who understands money and someone who understands building) from the wider community to join us, and are asking some other possible volunteers with the skills we need to also join us. The newly reconvened group will also include Jane, Jan (on her return from sick leave), a representative of the Friends, and one from St Mary's PCC/ Mothers Union (Win) as well as Emma with her fundraising skills. Hopefully you will see some action soon as a result - if we can find the money for the electricity first! I will try and keep everyone informed about progress ... slow though it may still be. If anyone else with skills in fundraising, building planning, project management, voluntary sector collaboration, history, architecture or building-associated trades etc. is interested in joining the Regeneration Steering Group please contact Jane on 01986 781760.

Dedicated Pat smashes through Fundraising target



A dedicated grandmother has raised £1722 for the charity which cared for her husband before his death by walking 120 miles in just eight days.

Pat Rennie, who lives in Holton, trekked the Suffolk Coastal Path from Lowestoft to Felixstowe, and the Sandlings Walk from Ipswich to Southwold, in memory of Bud, her husband of 54 years who passed away last year.

As well as honouring Bud's memory, Pat took on the colossal challenge to raise money for Halesworth Community Nursing Care Fund (HCNCF), which provided vital support to allow him to remain at home in the last few weeks of his life. She has smashed through her original target of £500.

Pat began the trek on 19 June and covered between 11 and 21 miles each day, reaching Southwold, her final stop, on Tues 26 June. To make the achievement even greater, she took on the challenge just days after celebrating her 75th birthday.

"It was an amazing walk with old friends, new ones and family, and they all had that special 'something' that made it so delightful," said Pat. "It will stay with me forever. Once I got going it was amazing and I thoroughly enjoyed almost all of it, but on a couple of days the heat was relentless by which time I had also picked up a couple of blisters. But the legs held out, and I finished in good time.

"Bud was with me every step of the way encouraging me on, as he used to when we did any lengthy and difficult terrains, and he is still very much with me today.

"I gained so much from the trek and would like to thank everyone who walked with me, helped with transport, put me up for the night, fed me and sponsored me so generously.

"To me and my family, Bud was our rock. He was truly a lovely and remarkable man and will always be my hero. HCNCF made such a difference to us by providing the specialist equipment and additional nursing support he needed to remain in the comfort of his own home, where he was at his happiest, in the last weeks of his life. I hope that the money I have raised through this walk will mean that other people can also be able to benefit from the same exceptional level of care which helped us so much."

Are we feeling tired and depressed by all the troubles of the world? He knows and understands. 'Come unto me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me... and you shall find rest unto your souls.' (St Matthew, ch. 11, v. 28 and 29). And in Isaiah, ch. 30, v. 15, we find soothing, reassuring words, 'In returning and rest shall ye be saved: in quietness and confidence shall be your strength.'

Such comforting assurances lift up our hearts at all times, and especially for the older ones among us, when we have to face the fact of death, something that must come to us all. It is only the end of our earthly journey, and the beginning of eternity. Ecclesiastes, ch. 12, v. 7, explains it perfectly: 'Then shall the dust return to the earth as it was, and the spirit shall return unto God, who gave it.'

Tennyson wrote a beautiful poem about this final crossing.

'Sunset and evening star, and one clear call for me, And let there be no moaning at the bar when I put out to sea.

Twilight and evening bell, and after that the dark, And let there be no sadness of farewell when I embark.

For though from out our bourne of time and place the flood may bear me far, I hope to see my Pilot face to face when I have crossed the bar.'

Dear friends, I wish you all a happy summer, with sunshine and cool showers, giving thanks to the Lord, for he is good to all, and his tender mercies are over all his works. (Ps. 145, v. 9).

From the **Ringing Chamber**



Ringing can be a very frustrating exercise. everyone is on form, the striking is even, rhythmic and inspiring, every "touch" comes back to rounds as it should, and we all feel good. The next week, one or two are off form, mistakes get made which upsets the rhythm, two people go wrong at the same time and, in order to avoid further unholy din, the performance is brought to a premature halt by a grumpy conductor snarling "stand!". It's the same with football of course, one week a thumping victory, the next the utter dejection of ignominious defeat. Ipswich Town fans will know just what I mean!

Both ringing and football are very much team games, and a team is only as strong as its weakest link. Despite Harry Kane, England would not have got to a world cup semi (as I write this!) final with Simon Dawson in goal: similarly Halesworth ringers would not have won the District striking competition with Jordan Pickford on the tenor.

What is unusual about ringing is that better ringers spend a lot of time encouraging not so good ones, even those who don't seem to improve. That has much to do with the fact that ringers are not so plentiful that we can pick and choose who rings where and when. If people show the commitment to turn up on a Sunday morning, when they could be reading the paper or having a lie-in, then they are always welcomed as part of the team, and as long as they are safe and can ring rounds without too much deviation

then the lowliest ringer can turn up anywhere and get a ring. Try turning up at Portman Road and asking for a game!

This inclusivity engenders not only good team spirit, but also a sociability that sees a good number of us in the White Hart on a Tuesday night after ringing, or at Cherie's for coffee on Sunday morning as an alternative to what the CofE has to offer. Given that sociability, it may seem strange that so few people try ringing as an option when there is so much rubbish on the telly.

I think the reason for the widespread indifference is a failure to appreciate what ringing is all about. Going to a cold church with no heating, kitchen or toilet to pull on a rope and make a loud noise does not sound like a great draw. Ringing a peal of "8-spliced Surprise Major" would, for a ringer, be an impressive achievement to be proud of, but will mean nothing to a muggle, or even to someone who has been learning to ring for a year or more.

How we get over this perception deficit I do not know. All I do know is that we have been lucky in Halesworth to have seen a steady stream of people turned into ringers, and loving it. But it has taken each of them two years or more of hard work to get to where they are from a standing start. In today's instant gratification society most people aren't prepared to wait that long.



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Summer holiday reading for hazy afternoons and warm evenings

are Avatar, Toy Story, The Piano, 12 years a slave, Godzilla (yes really!)

Quoting from a review: 'Josh Larsen, co-host of the Filmspotting podcast, makes a compelling case for seeing movies as prayers ... instinctive recognitions of things that are worthy of praise, of things being broken and needing to be put right, and our desperation for things to be other than they are ... (He) identifies 9 expressions of prayer framed within scripture ... (and) for each type of prayer he explores a diverse range of films, reflecting on his own spiritual journey ... The result is a remarkably thoughtful and spiritual book".






Halesworth & District Museum — From the Archives

What would you be, you wide East Anglian sky, Without church towers to recognise you.....¹

In the last edition of Blyth Valley Times the Museum recalled the excursion of the *Suffolk Institute of Archaeology and History* made to St Mary's in Halesworth, St Andrew's at Wissett, and on to Rumburgh and South Elmham in 1896. Today we would likely describe such outings as church-crawling, and many enjoy this fascinating pastime.

The faithful, however, may undertake a different sort of church crawl. On 12 December, during the Fiesta of the Virgin of Guadalupe, some people crawl down the long calzada (road) to give thanks for prayers answered at the Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe in Mexico City.

Every summer, on 15 August, Orthodox Christians from all over the world crawl to the church of Our Lady of Tinos in Greece. On disembarking the boat at the port of Tinos, many believers fall on their knees and literally crawl on hands and knees to the church to touch the holy icon of Virgin Mary, which can be found inside and is believed to have healing powers.

But, for those who treasure the heritage of churches, John Betjeman, poet and writer, wrote, I know no greater pleasure than church-crawling. It leads you to the remotest and quietest country. It introduces you to the history of England in stone and wood and glass which is always truer than what you read in books. You meet all sorts of people on your travels.²

During the 1930s, along with John Piper, the English painter, printmaker and designer of stained-glass windows and both opera and theatre sets, and Paul Nash, the surrealist painter, war artist, and photographer, Betjeman began a collaboration on Shell Guides, a series of guidebooks on the counties of Britain aimed mainly at motor-driving tourists. Betjeman described himself and Piper as a pair of 'Church Crawlers'.

In his poem, Church Going, Philip Larkin writes,

Back at the door I sign the book, donate an Irish sixpence,

Reflect the place was not worth stopping for.
Yet stop I did: in fact I often do,
And always end much at a loss like this,
Wondering what to look for; wondering, too,
When churches will fall completely out of use
What we shall turn them into, if we shall keep
A few cathedrals chronically on show,
Their parchment, plate and pyx in locked cases,
And let the rest rent-free to rain and sheep.³

In a variation, over 50 people joined a York Church Crawl, on 1 July 2006, with the West Gallery Music Association, walking between four churches and chapels at each one of which they made music and sang. Paul Emmerson wrote of the crawl, The impression is that, tucked away behind every street, on every street corner, or standing alone in its own glory, is some variety of church or chapel, offering a multitude of style, tradition and usage. Some are redundant though others hold services still. Others have passed from religious to secular ownership, including one, now a trendy bar, named - you'd never guess - the "Parish".

In Worcestershire, the Sidemoor First School and Nursery reports that, ... year 3 and 4 went on a church crawl around Bromsgrove. We visited the Baptist church and the Methodist

Centre in the morning. Here we looked at different Christian symbols and also saw a baptistry. We then had lunch in Sanders park. In the afternoon we looked at St John's Church and compared this to the others we had seen in the morning. We had a lovely day and enjoyed listening to people from the churches tell us all about why their church is special. Top marks to the school for arranging such an outing!

Church buildings are set apart to bear witness to the sacred and to the life of faith, to a three-way relationship between God, people and place. However, the *Report of the Church of England's Church Buildings Review Group* published in 2015, emphasised that, in addition to their role as places of worship, our church buildings need to be, ...sensitively combined with service to the community. The imaginative adaptation of church buildings for community use in many areas is breathing new life into them.⁴

The Reverend Lucy Winkett, Rector of St James's Church, Piccadilly, writes, We have been entrusted with the care of many beautiful and historic churches. These have been passed down to us from previous generations and our challenge is to care for them, maintain them and pass them on to those who come after us in at least as good a condition as that in which we received them. Our church buildings can be a valuable asset. They are a focal point for our communities, a reminder of God's presence and starting point for our worship, ministry and outreach in mission.

But if a theological resonance is found between the twin values of beauty and justice, then a historic building can be made more beautiful partly in order to make the world a more just place. We will redecorate the church interior, or install toilets, or a small kitchen, partly in order to make it a more beautiful place for the local mums and toddlers or night shelter project. It is the same principle as not keeping the most beautiful tea set in the glass cupboard where the cups and saucers become ornaments, but using them for the hospitable purposes for which they were made.

In the spring issue of the newsletter of Ancient Monuments Society and The Friends of Friendless Churches, Rachel Morley, recently appointed Director of the Friends, recalls another verse of John Betjeman,

And should we let the poor old churches die?
Do the stones speak? My word, of course they do.
Here in the midst of life they cry aloud:
'You've used us to build houses for your prayer;
You've left us here to die beside the road.'

How rich is the heritage of the churches of the Blyth Valley and, as in York, the variety of church and chapel, some redundant, some now in different guise in town and village. Surely, a place of worship can only be enhanced by preserving its heritage and displaying it to its best advantage for those who worship and visit alike.



...not just another committee!

At the recent Churches Together AGM, we were blessed with over 20 people who had Come Together to sing, pray and report on how the different denominations are witnessing and out-reaching to communities in the Blyth Valley and beyond. It was recognised that we are all facing Challenges Together. Part of the meeting involved praise and thanksgiving for the work of our Methodist fellowship who are facing the loss of their building; also prayer for their minister, Louise Morrissey, who as well as the challenges of ministry in Halesworth, is on a slow road to recovery from an injury to her ankle.

I have previously reported that Churches Together supports various projects including the Foodbank and Community Fund and the Beach Mission. Not only does the Foodbank provide tangible help to those in need, be it temporary or more long term, it unwittingly has become a means of outreach to those who have sought help. One volunteer commented that they have had users of the service return to say, 'Thank you'. This is a perfect example of how different members of the community can support each other and very often this is through prayer. Within our churches are prayer groups (some ecumenical). These are held mainly in individual homes but anyone seeking help can make contact through individual church websites or Sign of the Fish bookshop in the Market Place, Halesworth (Tel: 01986 875750). And, of course, we cannot forget the individual

parish churches and the work of the PCC's who offer their own pastoral support in addition to the Clergy.

Groups within the churches are also involved in 'Open the Book', which is an outreach programme for primary school children. Over the years several schools have participated in this programme and a team of volunteers are regularly involved bringing the bible alive by acting out the various stories and explaining their meaning. Another community project is the annual Southwold Beach Mission and at the end of July, the Reverend Jon Sermon and others will be taking a minibus of young people over to Southwold each day. In the United Reformed Church a holiday club is planned in the mornings between 13th and 17th August.

The recent fire at Patrick's Newsagents, which affected businesses and residents, is an example of how a community will come together to support those affected by trauma. The churches are also involved in the support being offered, and for those involved in the incident or anyone wishing to show support if only to 'lend an ear' a special service for the community has been arranged.

This is just a small overview of how members within our churches can help within the community and hopefully you will see that Churches Together is not just another committee.

WED 13th JUNE - Organ Recital by Jason Busby: 'THE KING OF INSTRUMENTS' (Thanks Doreen for review) On a sunny June afternoon 66 people were treated to St. Mary's Church resident Organist Jason Busby illustrating why the Organ is regarded as the 'King of Instruments' in a varied mixed programme of well known organ pieces and a few surprises, all to show its virtuosity, imitating various instruments of an orchestra. We also got a look at Jason playing while he explained the workings of the organ from a projection screen, before each piece. He told us the difficulty of the swell organ (top keyboard) the pipes are enclosed in a box with the pedal to open and close the box being very stiff and in the wrong position on the ancient organ!), but we didn't notice while Jason was playing.





As for the programme: We started with The Brass Section: (1) John Stanley's Trumpet Voluntary arranged by David Willcocks. (2) Paen: A song of Triumph by Oliphant Chuckerbutty. (3) Tuba tune in D Major. Op.15 by Carig Sellar Lang.

The Woodwind Section: (1) Elegy: G.T. Thalben-Ball. (2) Theme from the second movement of Symphony No.9. 'The New World': Antonin Dvorak arr. Richard Lloyd. (3) Adagio: Thomaso Giovanni Albinoni. (4) Jason transcribed the fourth piece for the organ, thinking it would adapt favourably, in fact it translated into a very moving piece - it was the well-known choral song by Karl Jenkins: Benedictus from 'The Armed Man'. (5) To finish this section Jason had also transcribed a famous piece of film music by John Williams: "Hymn to the Fallen" (from the film: Saving Private Ryan) this also brought out hidden elements adding to the pathos of the piece.

The Full Orchestra: These following pieces were a tribute to their Royal Highnesses the Duke & Duchess of Sussex played at their Wedding: Eternal Source of Light Divine: G.F. Handel. To open up all the stops!! Crown Imperial: William Walton: arr. Herbert Murrill. To finish the programme: Mendelssohn's Wedding March arr. Noel Rawsthorne.

But an encore was forthcoming: Prelude in Classic Style: by Gordon Young.



The whole recital was received by the audience with great enthusiasm, clapping and cheering, urging Jason to re-consider the statement he made earlier - "This is my first and last recital". I don't think the audience will let you Jason, you have to return by public demand. It was truly wonderful, many thanks to you, and as always thanks to the girls making the cakes, sandwiches, teas and coffees.

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Churches being used to boost mobile connectivity

A key new agreement between the Government and the Church of England could see many more churches used to boost mobile connectivity around Suffolk.

The initiative, designed to get isolated communities better connected, encourages churches to use their buildings and other property to host masts boosting 4G and mobile coverage. It aims to draw in part upon the 65% of Anglican churches in the UK situated in rural areas, which could be used to tackle sparse coverage

Soaring anywhere between 30 and 100 metres, where a spire is part of the fabric, the church tower is often the tallest structure around. This could make it an ideal location for telecommunication devices and broadband transmission equipment, including aerials and phone masts.

The new national agreement is a high level, non-financial accord between the Church and Government, which encourages more churches to support connectivity in rural communities. Any agreement, for which a rent may be paid, is between mobile and fixed operators and the local dioceses/parishes to agree.

The East Anglian Daily Times included an article on the subject recently and reported that The Rt Revd Martin Seeley, Bishop of the Diocese of St Edmundsbury and Ipswich, is among those championing the initiative nationally.

In the article, he said:

"Supporting our rural communities by increasing connectivity both for villagers and businesses is an issue I have been lobbying on for a while behind the scenes with others nationally.

"I am delighted with this new agreement and encourage churches in Suffolk to consider this. Our churches are at the heart of the communities they serve and this is another way as Christians we can make a difference.

"Any work needs to be very sensitive to our beautiful grade I and II* listed churches. But it can be achieved well as we have seen in Suffolk already with the several churches leading the way on this during the past several years."

PCCs in the Blyth Valley Team Ministry will be discussing the subject further.

Local company WiSpire are working together with Intouch systems to provide Broadband to the South Norfolk and North Suffolk regions, they have supplied these photographs of the equipment.
