# Moving from behind the Curate's spectacles to up front

As I sit and write this, we have just ended Palm Sunday, with our very wonky donkey surviving yet another procession from the library to church. Patched up and tidied, no one could tell that his back was crumbling (except those of us in on the secret). That donkey has had an annual outing on Palm Sunday for goodness knows how many years, since it was made by the Woolners. For the rest of the year, it sits quietly in St Mary's Halesworth, enduring the cycle of services, meetings, events, baptisms, weddings and funerals that take place all year round. If only that donkey could talk!

This year, the donkey and I had real cause to rejoice however, because following behind, singing (or in my case gasping for air between songs), waving palms and generally emulating Christ's entry into Jerusalem was a sizeable crowd of all ages and stages. And yes, those other hardy souls who had ventured out onto the Thoroughfare early-ish on a freezing cold Sunday morning to do an errand or two, did stop in their tracks and watch us. And yes, some took a palm cross away with them. Because we caught their interest maybe, or maybe because we were doing something important, something significant, something that is more than an echo of our Sunday School Palm Sunday processions since time immemorial. We were witnessing too, showing in real life action, the start of the greatest story ever told. Of course, we know the end of that story before we set out every year. At the time, only Jesus knew what the entry into Jerusalem meant for him. He knew it was the final act of radical defiance, the entry of a revolutionary into hostile territory and that he would die for his defiance.

Jesus was copying in his own right the prophesies of Zechariah centuries prior to him — when Zechariah said "Rejoice greatly, Daughter Zion! Shout, Daughter Jerusalem! See, your king comes to you, righteous and victorious, lowly and riding on a

not so subtly) signalling that he was the King, (THE KING in fact) a message that would infuriate the Jews, and threaten the Romans. I know that we (unlike Jesus) were not in any way doing something radical, subversive or revolutionary in walking down the Thoroughfare behind wonky donkey. We were in many ways doing something traditional and small c — conservative. BUT we were, at the same time, doing something abnormal and unusual; something vitally important to us as it heralds the fact that Jesus died to save us from our sins and to give us eternal life.

Christians the world over daily do small things, individual

things which seem radical and revolutionary to others who neither share nor respect what we stand for, or believe or maybe just don't understand it. Christians are persecuted in many countries for their faith. We are not going to be. The worst we could face is a bit of mild ridicule or puzzled bemusement, but all the more reason why we should publically stand up and be counted. At Pause for Thought in May, Alison will be leading a service thinking about the dangers and challenges experienced by persecuted Christians in many parts of the world. Everyone is welcome to attend. Why not come along? Or, if the whole thing is a complete mystery to you, why not take a small radical step of your own ... go to a service somewhere across the Blyth Valley in May, or sign up to one of our bible study groups, or even ask me to drop by for a chat. We could sit in front of wonky donkey to talk. He will keep his own counsel for another year until yet again we herald the horrors of Good Friday and the amazing miracle of Easter Day by trolling down the Thoroughfare singing Hosanna. Tane

# ST EDMUND'S RC CHURCH, HALESWORTH

May - surely the most beautiful month of the year, everything in the natural world clean and new, before the heat and dust of the summer months have darkened the foliage and turned the grass brown. The uncertainties of April, the sudden showers and misty mornings are now replaced by warm Spring sunshine. Bare branches of the tallest trees are overnight covered in a green mist as the new and tender leaves appear. Hawthorn hedges turn from brown to brilliant green, and the May flower lies upon them like snow. The fruit trees are in blossom, promising apples, pears and plums in due season, and our gardens are suddenly filled with flowers - I'm looking at a clump of purple aubrietia as I write, and primroses are brightening the lawn with their delicate blooms.

May is traditionally Mary's month, and the beauty of nature blends well with the sweet, maternal spirit of the Mother of God. Catholics down the ages have prayed to her, though the Church's teaching nowadays is to pray with her rather than to her, not that there is any harm in turning to her when we need courage and guidance; she always directs us towards her Son.

Mary appears in all four Gospels of the New Testament, enough to give us a rounded picture of a serious, devout young woman who accepted the angel's amazing message, and immediately set out to visit her cousin Elizabeth with the news. She and Joseph provided the child Jesus with a happy upbringing, but her sky darkened as the years went by and his ministry approached its end. She must have pondered over Simeon's prophecy that a sword would pierce her heart - and we cannot begin to imagine how she felt when she stood at the foot of the Cross where he hung in his last agony, the moment when he handed her over to the care of the disciple John, and proclaimed her as John's Mother and ours.

We can call upon Mary at any time to join her prayers with ours. 'Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death. Amen.'

# HALESWORTH & BRAMFIELD UNITED REFORMED CHURCHES

Dear Friends,

I find that, again, the most striking thing to report from our church life is prayer! By the time this comes out, Easter will be over, but I write as we enter Holy Week. Not only has the intensity of our Friday morning prayer meetings been really encouraging, but we recently added a Saturday morning too! Our prayer ministry team, at a recent meeting to pray for each other and for training and mutual encouragement, asked me to preach (sometime soon) on different ways of praying — and yes, I will. We have had examples of listening to God together on several recent Fridays, and the Saturday came about following a suggestion from one individual of calling a special 'day of prayer'.

The background to the Saturday prayer day started with prayer for one of our number with a long-term health issue. This led on to realisation of many who struggle, then a change of emphasis to the clergy and church leaders across all denominations. Almost all have had health problems themselves or with a close family member. Out of this came the 'call' to pray for church leaders and their families. This widened to the whole community — and indeed for the healing of our nation. So I issued the call, for those who could to come together to pray — and for others to pray at home. This could include fasting (whether in relation to food or anything else) for those who felt that was their call.

So, we had a powerful time of prayer, joined by at least one person from another church, praying those themes. And I know of several who consciously set aside that time to pray at home. Alongside this, I'm aware of growing numbers and vibrancy in the local ecumenical prayer groups that have sprung up. And my own experience of meeting with the Revd Jane Held to prepare joint activities and pray together has brought a sense that we are at the dawn of a new era of greater co-operation between our churches. Prayer can be aloud or silent, in your own language or in tongues. It can include singing, shouting, crying, dancing... Culture has dulled us to this reality, but communication (two way) with our creator is something we are meant for. In this month's 'Christianity' magazine, there's an article about prayer, written by Pete Grieg, founder of the 24/7 prayer movement: He suggests 3 essentials:

Keep it Simple ..... Keep it Real ..... Keep it Up

This fits with the way prayer is intended to be the most natural thing. Don't make prayer over-complicated, intense or weird. Just 'be' with God. The 'real' bit is needed because when life is tough, it would be too easy to try to 'put on a brave face' — even to God. We can't escape His presence anyway (Psalm 139:7-12). The creator God who 'knit us together in our mothers' wombs' cares too much for that. And we need to keep going. That includes what God has recently called our church into.

So, the next 'Saturday Special' (we haven't given it that title, it was just an easy way to refer to what we did recently) will be **Saturday 18th May**. And we deliberately want to host this and MAKE IT AVAILABLE TO ALL. So please join us from other churches, to pray for the church as a whole, the community of Halesworth and the Blyth Valley and the nation!

We'll be meeting at the **URC** at **11.30am**, for about an hour. And many will be focused on prayer that day, at home as well as together, throughout the day as well as at that time.

# What is "Pause for Thought"?

How much do we know about what happens in other churches in the Blyth Valley Team? As I begin the exciting opportunity to lead worship in different churches, I thought it might be useful to share with each other the variety of worship on offer in our churches each month.

"Pause for Thought" is one of the more informal services that happens regularly in the Blyth Valley Team. It takes place on the fourth Sunday each month at 11.15am in St Peter's Church, Wenhaston. times of silence and sometimes opportunities to listen to music as well as sing. Prayer time is an opportunity for anyone to offer up their own prayer for someone or something concerning them.

At "Pause for Thought" on Sunday 26th May, we will be thinking about the dangers and challenges experienced by persecuted Christians in many parts of the world. Everyone is welcome to attend. Why not come along, especially if there is no service happening in your own church?

### **Worship and Service Patterns**

Three things about worship and our worship pattern. Firstly, a sincere apology to our loyal, dedicated band of 8am Holy Communion members in Halesworth. The service patterns with all the Team Services, coupled with shortfalls in staffing, mean I inadvertently shortchanged you so you ended up with only one service in 5 weeks. My sincere apologies. We are back to 2 services a month from May and I will endeavor to "do better" in future.

Secondly, we are now going to be holding a short "daily office" service every day of the week (except Saturdays) from May onwards. We will say Morning Prayer in St Mary's Lady Chapel every Monday and Tuesday at 9am. We have Midweek Eucharist at St Mary's at 10am every Wednesday. On Thursday we say Morning Prayer (BCP) at Bramfield at 9am (lifts can be given) and every Friday Morning Prayer at Holton (lifts can be given) at 9am. These are short quiet services lasting about 15 minutes. All are welcome.

Thirdly, EXPLORE-2! — our monthly children's service, designed by children and led by children (for children from birth to when they feel it's too young for them (around about 10 or 12 years old)) is at 3pm on the third Sunday of each month at St Peter's Spexhall - again all are welcome to an exciting alternative sort of Messy Church — from Halesworth and every village too.

Oh yes - and the fourth thing! Pentecost Sunday is on June 9<sup>th</sup> and not only will we be holding our major Churches Together Service on Holton Paddock, but we will also be visited by Bishop Mike who is coming to meet with our EXPLORE! Outdoor Church After School Club at Ilketshall St Lawrence school at 11.45am that morning. Rumour has it that a bonfire will be involved! And if there is a bonfire there has to be..... sausages and toasted marshmallows!

About Christian Aid: The charity has more than 70 years experience of working in partnership to support communities to thrive. They tackle the root causes of poverty so that women, men and children the world over are strengthened against future knocks. And if disasters happen, they get people the help they need straight away. Every year, during this week in May, Christian Aid focus on a particular area in need. This year it is Sierra Leone. Since the outbreak of Ebola the country has been heavily in debt and cannot afford basic healthcare and medicines. On Saturday 11th May, there is an organised walk in the



# From the **Ringing Chamber**



I was recently contacted by the tower captain at Mendham to see if I could help to teach three new ringers, or rather three people who had expressed an interest in learning to ring. This is potentially a huge commitment. Learning to ring involves one-to-one sessions for three to six months followed by close supervision until the learner is safe to be left alone, and even then continued supervision is advisable to stop the inevitable bad habits developing. Teaching three people at once triples the time commitment. And to make things worse the dropout rate is notoriously high, as only the most tenacious of learners will put up with the time it takes to master a good technique. Nevertheless, for two reasons I agreed to help.

I met with the three recruits and, although they were considerably older than the ideal (about 14) they all showed interest, intelligence, enthusiasm and an eagerness to learn. They were very open to the idea of travelling to other towers and seemed to understand the difficulties of learning this extraordinary skill. On top of that I was very gratified that my plea to other NE District ringers for help brought forth six offers from competent ringers, all prepared to give their time to help another tower build up its band. This is typical of the ringing world: there is nothing in it for them, other than the satisfaction of creating new ringers.

Time will tell how we get on.

Meanwhile, back home, things have been ticking over There was some particularly satisfying unspectacularly. ringing on Palm Sunday when we were joined by Mike's daughter Clare who rings in Cambridgeshire. Competent Visitor Factor then applied as everybody raised their game, not wishing to embarrass themselves in the presence of a visitor who clearly knew what they were doing, and as a result we managed some very respectable call changes as well as a course of Plain Bob Major and a very good lower at



#### MRS DAWN ELIZABETH LEGGETT

A Service of Thanksgiving for the life of Mrs Dawn Elizabeth Leggett was held in St Peter's Church, Holton, on March 29th. She passed away peacefully at her home in Holton on March 2nd, aged 74. The Revd Bill Mahood officiated, with Jason Busby on the organ.

In his address the Revd Mahood said that Dawn was born on 13th November 1944 to Margery and Alan Abrams in the Clifton area in Bristol where Margery was evacuated, due to the war, to stay with relatives. She was their second child.

In the mid 1950's the family were living at Shenfield when Dawn trained and worked as a telephonist at Barclays Bank in London. During that time she met Reg Leggett and they were married in September 1963 and lived in a flat in Forest Gate. They saved enough for their first house on a new estate in Writtle, Chelmsford, but had been there for only a short time when Reg's firm asked him to move to Halesworth to help and establish a new factory there and they moved to their present house in Holton in 1967.

Dawn worked in the office of the new factory for about a year and moved from there to work for the Halesworth doctors in their dispensary in Halesworth Market Place, during which time she had two children, Wendy and Mark. She later worked in the new surgery at Cutlers Hill. She then qualified as a keep fit instructress and had her own classes which she took to perform at the Royal Albert Hall and Seymour Hall in London.

She then trained and passed exams to be a doctors' practice manager, but never took a post doing this. After leaving the surgery she became self-employed, making soft furnishings. Keen on sport she enjoyed playing tennis in Halesworth and golf in Southwold. Never idle at home she enjoyed working in their garden and for relaxation she created some exquisite tapestries.

When she stopped working she took up playing bridge which she loved and played 3 or 4 times a week at clubs in Southwold and Walberswick and with friends in their homes. She will always be remembered for her smile and happy disposition and always willing to help others and, as one member put it, "a light has gone out of our lives". Dawn loved and enjoyed her family and all get-together days and she liked to travel in their mobile home, the first one of which she helped to fit out, and she enjoyed overseas holidays. On their last and 15<sup>th</sup> holiday in Eygpt she was unwell, and on returning home she saw their doctor and was being treated, but on the second day home she died in Reg's arms.

The family and immediate mourners were her husband Reg, Mr & Mrs P Blankley (daughter), Mr M Leggett and Linda (son), Emma, Oliver, Georgia and Arron (grandchildren), Mr & Mrs P Abrams (brother), Mr & Mrs G Speller (sister), Neil and Jodiean Speller, Paul Speller (nephews), Nathan (great nephew) Hannah and Larissa (great nieces), Mr & Mrs W Childs, Mr & Mrs E Clarke (cousins), Mr & Mrs F Ashford, Margaret Blankley. Roy Wells.

The commendation, committal and blessing were given in the Church and exit music was Enya's *Journey of the Angels*. There were beautiful floral tributes from Reg and the family and cremation followed. Donations in the Church in memory of Dawn for the East Anglian Air Ambulance amounted to £460. #### A concert for John Stevenson OBE

I caught the 15:47 Diss to London Liverpool Street train on  $6^{th}$  April (following a wedding at St Andrew's Wissett), then the tube to Bow Church, a short walk to the Docklands Light Railway station and got off at All Saints. Up the stairs and round to the right was the imposing tower of All Saints Church, Poplar.

I was so pleased I could attend a concert dedicated to John Stevenson OBE, by the London Dockland Singers. Andrew Campling (conductor) and Sir Andrew Parmley (organ) both worked with John and were honoured to be part of the evening. Lady Parmley read the Eulogy at John's funeral service in St Andrew's Bramfield. The Church was beautifully simple in decoration, with perfect acoustics, the organ situated high at the west end, the choir at the east. The evening started with Faure's sublime Cantique de Jean Racine and concluded with Faure's Requiem (brought back a lot of happy memories from when I was a boy chorister).

I climbed up to the organ loft during the interval to meet Sir Andrew who showed me the organ console and highlighted a couple of electrical faults with the organ and how the trumpet stop was marked so it wasn't used in error due to it's power! A fine modern organ dating from just 1953, a rebuild of a Hunter organ; "presumably a 'new' organ in the old case"; this organ was brought from Clapham Congregational Church.


With other pieces by Holst and Howells and two compositions by Andrew Campling, in particular his setting of George Herbert's poem, *The Elixir* was commissioned by the Worshipful Company of Glass Sellers for their 350<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Service in St. James Garlickhythe, City of London in 2014. A fine piece of music.

After the interval Lady Parmley on behalf of Charles presented a cheque in memory of John for £10,000 to the Headmistress of the all girls, St. Marylebone CE School where John was Headmaster. The money going into the Schools Prize giving fund. I'm sure John was with us in spirit enjoying every minute of the concert. My only grumble.....I had an hour before my train home, grabbed a quick pint at £6.50! £6.50 for a pint! The concert was worth it.

Rest in peace John and rise in glory.

# Halesworth & District Museum - A Sporting Life<sup>1,2</sup>

One of the most impressive recent additions to the Halesworth sporting scene is the Halesworth Golf Club. Before 1991, when it was opened, Halesworth golfers had traditionally travelled to Southwold to play. On the inspiration of Tony and Rosie Ward, an 18 and a 9 hole course were laid out on 190 acres of farmland north of the Bramfield Road, overlooking the Blyth Valley.

Now owned by Mr and Mrs Jon Hunt, it has been steadily improved over the last 30 years or so, and its several hundred members can now enjoy what has been described by the Suffolk Golf Union as "the best conditioned golf course in Suffolk".

With a range of trophy and club competitions, there is a crowded Club programme running alongside the opportunity for a quiet game among friends.

As Criswell Freeman says in his poem:

"Life is like a round of golf, With many a turn and twist...

But the game is much too sweet and short, To curse the shots you've missed.

Sometimes you'll hit it straight and far. Sometimes the putts roll true.

But each round has its errant shots And troubles to play through.

So always swing with courage No matter what the

And never let the hazards Destroy the joy inside.

And keep a song within your heart. Give thanks that you can play.

For the round is much too short and sweet To let it slip away".





It cannot have escaped your notice that the Sign of the Fish bookshop is somewhat petite, "bijou" even, and (stretching the metaphor), although we hope you will find a "bijou", we cannot display a wide range of the best of current Christian publishing, and it is rare indeed to find more than one copy of any title, so it's "first come, first serve", don't be disappointed if the book you are interested in is no longer in the shop, we are happy to take orders. (On that note **A Guide to the End of the World** reviewed in the March issue of BVT is back in stock).

Here are some recent publications dealing with contemporary yet eternal issues, all of which have received 4 or 5 star reviews and all of which will be in the shop (at least for a while!).



Honesty over Silence: it's OK not to be OK, by Patrick Regan 2018 The sub-title sums this book up beautifully. From the "blurb": (it) seeks to open up conversations around topics that many find difficult such as trusting in God through life's ups and downs, dealing with anxiety and depression, the challenges of parenting a child with special

needs, living in community, learning to look after ourselves, developing our character, and living with thankful hearts even in tough seasons. It will examine the strength in letting go of our need to be in control as well as looking at how we can stop comparing ourselves to others and instead live authentically and honestly as we grow into the people God has created us to be.



Can We Trust the Gospels? by Peter J Williams 2018 This is a good summary of a complex subject, but adds new insights along the way, based on first-hand research. One reviewer has found it useful when presented with the atheist memes that are so prevalent on the Internet. On the

whole the scholarly author's own conclusions stand: "it is rational to have a high degree of confidence in the text of the Gospels as it appears in modern editions".




# How to pray: a simple guide for normal people, by Pete Greig 2019

Published at the beginning of April this book is already a best-seller on the topic of prayer — perhaps it was the sub-title that sold it initially! Certainly it's a topic that most folk struggle with at some time, and yet it is our life blood as Christians. This down-to-earth introduction uses

the Lord's Prayer as the model, (which after all was Jesus's response to his disciples' request "Lord, teach us how to pray") unpacking nine important themes: stillness, adoration, petition, intercession, perseverance, contemplation, listening, confession and spiritual warfare.

That hideous strength: how the West was lost, by Melvin Tinker 2018 The title is taken from the horribly prophetic, or prescient, final volume of C S Lewis's space/fantasy trilogy. Many are now dismayed at what seems to be the whittling away and outright



attack on our formerly Judaeo-Christian culture and civilisation. Others embrace this as enlightened diversity, a better, fairer way, perhaps not realising it is a view largely and relentlessly promoted by the media. The author seeks to open our eyes to the dangers of the latter world-view in an engaging way.

#### Wenhaston WI's April Meeting

For some time Sutton Hoo was thought to be a Viking burial plot but our speaker Peter Carter soon abused us of that notion. Sutton Hoo is an extremely important Anglo Saxon archeologically site, as it is from the middle of the Dark Ages. Historians had an idea of life under the Romans as it had been well documented, then nothing until Alfred the Great. The finds at Sutton Hoo clearly show that the Anglo Saxons had a highly developed and noble culture with greatly skilled crafts men and sophisticated marine architects.

It is thanks to Mrs Pretty, who was living at Tranner House, that the site was excavated. After her husband died she became interested in Spiritualism, looking over her land she became convinced there was something to be found. She contacted Ipswich museum and employed Basil Brown to excavate the site. Many wonderful artefacts have

been found (other than the well-known helmet) jewellery, belts, coins and silver wear. A mysterious object was unearthed, great excitement! It turned out to be a roller-skate; it had been thrown into the pit by Mrs Pretty's son.

An interesting and informative lecture, inspiring us all to visit when all the improvements have been made and the site is open again in a few months' time.

The ornamentation in the Baroque songs was handled with some dexterity and in several pieces the mood was well captured. ## **William Beeston Coyte**

# A Curate and his contact with the Military in Halesworth, and his Physic Garden in Ipswich

An intriguing paper relating to "The Beeston-Coyte Hortus Botanicus Gippovicensis", (essentially a catalogue of plants), resides on Halesworth Museum shelves. It was written by John Blatchly and Jenny James. (Proc. Suffolk Inst. Archaeol, XXX1X 1999)

Intriguing for A nony mouse because for a few years, the author of the "Hortus", William Beeston Coyte (1740-1810), was curate at St Mary's Church in Halesworth. He was born in Queen Street Ipswich where his father, (another William), was a Bachelor of Medicine and cultivated a 1.1 acre Physic Garden. After attending Ipswich School, he went up to Queens College, matriculated and took MB, and was ordained deacon in 1763.

The new curate was already in Halesworth when the settlement for his marriage to Sarah, daughter of Capt Robert and Mary Rowning of Ipswich, was drawn up in 1764. Patron of the living in the town was William Plumer and Rector of St Mary's, the Revd Thomas Forster.

The Rev Forster was in part responsible for the bustling and revitalized town that Coyte arrived in. For, as a Commissioner of the Blyth Navigation, in which he invested £100, he facilitated in the opening up of a navigable waterway between Halesworth and Southwold for trade, the first wherry arriving in the town in July 1761.

Preparations were underway as well for the building of the new 'House of Industry' at Bulcamp for paupers. The first bricks for which were laid in March 1765; this was opened in October 1766, but not before a riot had taken place there during the previous August. This tumultuous event necessitated a party of soldiers being sent from Ipswich, a rioter lost his life and six others were imprisoned; more than £500 worth of damage was done.

A nony mouse, still intrigued, viewed the original minute book for the 'House of Industry', and the marriage and baptism registers for Halesworth. (SRO.L) An extract from the minute book, dated 30 September 1765, relates the Directors and Guardians response to the riot, "To have a guard stationed at the building, and to effect same by writing to the Commanding Officer at Halesworth for a detachment of a Corporal and five soldiers to be sent each night."

Unexpected evidence of the settled Military presence in Halesworth is provided by Coyte's own hand. Examination of the marriage register for the year to September 1766 reveals not only did Coyte officiate at all of the weddings, but that no less than nine of them were of Regimental men. Coyte records General Elliot's Regiment of Light Horse (1), the 43<sup>rd</sup> Regiment of Foot (7), and General Stanwick's Regiment of Foot (1). Only one of the weddings was by licence, with eight being by banns, denoting residency. Just over half the couples signed their name with a cross.

William and Sarah's first child, a daughter Sarah, was baptised in the town on 16 February 1766, their second daughter Mary on the 5 June 1767. William Beeston Coyte never took priest's orders, and soon after with his family returned to live in

Queen Street, Ipswich. He became an MD and took over the cultivation of the Physic Garden, the third generation of his family to do so.

For this garden had been founded by his great uncle, William Beeston MD, who on his death in 1732 bequeathed it to his nephew, Coyte's father. Beeston is remarked upon as an eminent physician, exquisitely skilled in botanic knowledge, and as living next to his Physic Garden with a collection of rare and exotic plants, in a letter written by the notable Daniel Defoe (author of *Robinson Crusoe* 1720), who visited Ipswich in 1722.

The Beeston-Coyte Physic Garden, whilst fronting onto Queen Street, extended in the rear to Thursbys Lane (now Princes Street), and is wonderfully detailed on Joseph Pennington's engraved map of Ipswich 1778.

According to Coyte, *The Hortus Botanicus Gippovicensis* 1796 (SRO.I) is a systematical enumeration of the plants he cultivated in his Botanic Garden in Ipswich with botanical observations. More than 2000 species in fact, some of them under glass with a stove.

The Hortus though is more than a catalogue of plants as it provides results from his investigation of the natural produce of some grass-lands in high Suffolk. This was on turf he had taken from Tannington Green and grown on in Ipswich. He wished to analyse the content of the grass of dairy farms in relation to the quality of their butter.

We have evidence as well of his finely developed sense of humour; he wrote the following epistle to John Wood, Esq., Fiddler and Dancing Master in Ipswich. After a fit of the gout:

The Gout, to All a sad Disaster, But most to you, a Dancing Master,

Who cannot move, Who cannot go, Or Trip it, with yr Gouty Toe?

But since a remedy is known for all things, save Death alone;

If the hard Ground yr tender Feet can't bear, Stand on your Head,

and lift em up in the Air, And do the Minuet Step & Rigadoon it there.

Coyte was also a Fellow of the Linnaean Society and in correspondence with its founder James Edward Smith, who sent him some Indian seeds. He received plants from Joseph Banks and James Sowerby, and mounted botanic expeditions to North Wales in 1788, and South Wales and Cornwall in 1794.

Coyte can be added to the list of Georgian botanists associated with Halesworth and district; he joins Humphry Repton, Dawson Turner, Sir William Jackson Hooker and Sir Joseph Dalton Hooker.
