Greetings! from the Mothers' Union Diocesan Trustees and Officers

Latest Update from Canterbury Strategy Group

In our Diocese, during lockdown, the Trustees and Officers have been meeting via "Zoom" to conduct our MU business, and prayerfully seek God's plan for all of us here in Suffolk.

Mary Sumner House have also been meeting – daily in some cases – to work through the difficulties which this pandemic brings, so herewith the latest information:

Good News! We rejoice and give thanks to God that, to date, £567k in donations* has been sent to MSH for the appeal and money from overseas is on its way too.

When Nikki Sweatman (our previous Provincial President) attended the recent Worldwide Council in Rwanda, she told us it was the first time some of the African nations realised that the money they received as grants came largely from ordinary members in Britain and Ireland through their fundraising and donations. They were very concerned because they had not considered their grants in that way, and many acknowledged they could do more for themselves.

Also reported - 50% of MSH staff are working at the moment. However, due to Coronavirus, there will be some restructuring taking place around the conference facilities, as part of cost-cutting measures.

There has been much discussion about harnessing the technology that people have got more used to for keeping in contact, particularly for younger people.

We, as Diocesan Presidents, have also been asking for more communication from MSH about structure, finances, meeting times etc, in order to be kept abreast of all that is going on so that we can inform our MU members.

This newsletter comes to say we have not forgotten you. We still care about you! We recognise the difficulties that all of us are facing - every day is different – some days are good, and others are not: we are losing loved ones – our friends, relatives, and those who are dear to us, but we cannot grieve in ways familiar to us; some marriages are beginning to feel the real strain as the roles of parenting changes, and that too impacts on us; for others it will be work-related; and we know that some churches and charities will make it through this crisis – others will not – but prayer changes outcomes...

In order to survive we need to embrace change – to be flexible in our thinking, to be creative and find new ways of doing things. Crisis is also an accelerator! So, we ask, "what do these changes now make possible for us?"

We are a local charity with a worldwide vision. As one of our trustees says, "We are not a diocese with members too old and frail to make a significant difference to the Mothers' Union [locally and] worldwide. We are in fact a diocese with members who have an incredible wealth of life experiences. Our members pray, reach out in love to their communities through their smiles, conversations and friendships and have been steadfast in their support of Mothers' Union for a combined number of years that probably reaches the tens of thousands." And that when I water my plants and wash my dishes and take
a shower may it be counted as remembering my baptism.

And that when the tears come and my shoulders shake and my
breathing falters, may it be counted as prayer.

And that when I stumble upon a Tabitha Brown video and hear
her grace and love of you may it be counted as a hearing a
homily.

And that as I sit at that table in my apartment, and eat one
more homemade meal, slowly, joyfully, with nothing else
demanding my time or attention, may it be counted as
